#### Call to order:

Hopp called the meeting to order at 6:31 p.m.

## **Approval of Minutes:**

# **City Council Liaison Report:**

Cronin updated the board regarding the eastside sanitary sewer project and the Ice Age trail restoration project. She also reported about the regular progress meetings to be held to monitor these projects.

# **Library Director's Report:**

Burkart updated the board that there have been 669 signups for the Winter library challenge. 30 gift certificates and gift cards, worth \$25 each, have been bought from the local small businesses for the challenge to support the local community. She also reported that the first paycheck of the year was delayed owing to the holiday on the first Friday that caused trouble for some employees. She also stated that COVID-19 sick leaves for the employees were not extended by the city, that left the part-time employees without any sick leave this year. She also added that the staff has finetuned the curbside pickup operations and the staff feel safe to come to work at the library.

## **Old Business:**

1. Discussion and possible action regarding library response to COVID-19 and metrics needed to reopen the library: Conwell shared and elaborated the data snapshot of COVID-19 from PHMDC showing a slight increase in the cases after the holidays as expected. Hospitalization number is decreased. Nationally cases are going up and can impact our community in the coming weeks.

Burkart reached out to the other area libraries to gather more information about their metrics to reopen. Most of the libraries are using PHMDC data and need the community spread numbers to be in yellow or green zone in order to consider the reopening.

The board decided to stay in the same phase with potential reopening in mid-spring. Meanwhile the library will continue to be engaged in the community and continue to offer programs for the community.

## **New Business:**

1. Discussion and possible action regarding the Dane County Library Service Agreement for Extension of Library Service: A motion was made by Huemmer, seconded by Kurth to sign the Dane County Library Service Agreement for Extension of Library Service. Motion carried.

In 2020, we were one of the only suburban/urban Dane County libraries to remain open for express service into the fall. The result was that many patrons began using our library to pick up their holds rather than use their home libraries. Other SCLS libraries saw a marked decrease in the number of holds placed (up to -40% fewer holds placed) but Verona had an increase of +9.8% holds placed compared with 2019. The only other library in SCLS to have holds increase in 2020 was Waunakee at +0.3%. This is one factor to consider about the timing of reopening the library.

## Curbside pick-up:

The demand for curbside appointments was a little lower in December due to the holidays but still steady at 3596 appointments for the month.

# Draft – 1<sup>st</sup> phase of reopening (date TBD)

In the initial phase of reopening, the focus would be on quick visits, 15 minutes or less. The public could come into the library to pick-up holds and browse in limited areas. There would be no seating or tables available. As pandemic conditions improve over time, open hours would expand and curbside hours would decrease.

# Areas open to the public for browsing:

Center of library, Adult Fiction, Teen, AV

## Reorganizing staff work areas and services:

- Move check-in to the circulation room
- Holds could be done at the reference desk during non-public hours and at the extra workstation
   Study Room 1 during open public hours
- Quarantined books & to be shelved carts would be located outside Quiet Reading Room
- Photocopier moved to the temporary computer lab (Community Room)
- Move more display tables/shelving to the prow no public seating available
- Quiet Reading Room would remain closed to the public, needed for meetings and virtual programs during this phase
- Children's area remains closed to public but a selection of children's materials would be available for browsing in the center of the library
- Have a "greeter" in the lobby (or outside front doors) to monitor capacity limits and mask compliance during open hours

## Impacts on staff workflow:

- Pick list, shelving holds, and shelving would not be done in areas open to the public during open hours to minimize contact between staff and public
- Library pages normally schedule for the evenings could shelve in the children's area or organize carts, or could temporarily shift their schedules
