V. Equipment and Physical Facilities

The center area of the library is now fully carpeted, Sergenians completed the work on March 18. We are now working on dates to start carpeting the adult side of the building and targeting September or October.

Discussions are continuing with the city and their insurance company about the library continuing to have Narcan on hand due to staff safety and liability issues.

VI. Administration and Internal Operations

South Central Library System will be moving into a new headquarters facility May 27 -30. Because this also includes moving the servers, libraries will not have internet or computers during this four day time frame.

Stacey spent a lot of time this month working with Abby and Trudy working on the materials and publicity for the Microsculpture exhibit.

The annual 5K Run/Walk fundraising planning is coming along, with work continuing to secure sponsorships, get approval from the County Parks department and a special event permit from the city, meeting with the race timing company, and promoting the event. There are currently 108 participants registered.

Stacey, Ronda, and Sara are continuing to work on a process to send delinquent library accounts to collections.

VII. Marketing and Public Relations

The Value of Contributions by Citizen Scientists

Thursday, March 30, 6:30 - 7:30 pm

Interested in ecology? Want to make a difference though conservation? Anyone in the community, young or old, can help contribute to science in a meaningful way. Citizen science activities such as monitoring dragonflies or water quality on a nearby stream or lake, help the scientific community gather wider data sets than they could collect on their own. The Upper Sugar River Watershed Association will explain how the data that citizen scientists collect helps the WI Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to form a picture of habitat health that then informs and influences State DNR policies and laws.
