V. Equipment and Physical Facilities

The library has received an updated quote for a new sorter.

The equipment for the new boilers have been delivered and will be installed when the weather warms up.

We are planning for shelf moving and carpet installation in the children's area are April 29 – May 10. The Children's area and Teen Central will be closed during part/all of those dates. Some children's materials will be available for browsing in the center of the library and in the Community Room.

VI. Administration and Internal Operations

Based on patron feedback, Abby, Mark, and Ronda created an Outer Library Loan form for the library website that allows patrons to request OLL's online. This is a welcome update for patrons and staff.

VII. Marketing and Public Relations

Abby created 35 event graphics (website, Facebook, TV) along with related event bookmarks/flyers/signs.

Tonja created a display promoting the state parks pass giveaway.

Abby attended part of the Management meeting on March 6 to discuss ideas for spotlighting Verona Public Library accomplishments in the email newsletter, social media, print calendar.

Abby created a statistical graphic highlighting the library's 2023 annual report statistics. The graphic was shared on the library events TV, website, email newsletter, and social media.

Abby also spotlighted the upcoming Robert Kurson author event. The bestselling author will be at the library following a visit to Sugar Creek Elementary school.

Katie created a book display featuring items titled with *Hello and Goodbye*. Jenny created a display titled, *Oh Wait. It's Spring Break* featuring travel guide and travel writing books. Circulation staff created display focusing on Garden Planning and another on Ireland.

Amy T, Mark, and Maureen contributed staff reviews for the Verona Press.

Use of the Personal Archiving Lab has been on a steady increase. In addition to the typical digitization projects, Mark shared there is a younger patron who is developing 35mm negatives at home and then "uses the PAL to view his old-school photography experiments".

VIII. System and Interagency Cooperation

Leah collaborated with Teresa Voss to host a makerspace program at VAHS. She also met with Melanie Galdes (the new BRMS/CKCS librarian) to discuss ways in which we could colloborate. She will be working on getting library card applications to all interested middle school students.

Tonja attended the ILS Evaluation Discovery Layer Workgroup meeting on March 20.

Theresa had the first meetings for the ILS evaluation: one for the lead workgroup, cataloging, serials, and circulation. The vendor demos will be May 8 - 9, and May 29 - 30.

Theresa attended the Collection Maintenance Subcommittee meeting on March 13. One area library reported that a magazine they ordered through Ebsco appeared to be AI generated.

IX. Fundraising

At the end of 2023, the library endowment fund balance was \$432,492, a net increase of \$50,475 for the year from contributions and interest. The library has \$14,205 available for disbursement this year for the *Dogs: More than Pets* exhibit and related programs.
