Ronda weeded the paperback collection in preparation for the new study pods coming in next month.

Ronda started weeding the AV collections and has completed the audiobook collection.

Theresa and Ronda ordered and replaced the in-library use only Chromebooks. A patron used one of the new Chromebooks and said that it was great, easy to use, and fast.

The library has added a new e-resource, Publishers Marketplace. Users have access to industry news, book reviews and sales information, and information about agents and publishing companies.

Inventory continues, and is progressing quickly. Theresa requested the barcode scanner kit from SCLS, and we've been able to have multiple people working on inventory at a time.

Jenny completed the inventory of the Board Game collection, with approximately 50% of games being in good condition, 30% of games needing repair, and the remaining games were removed from the collection due to condition or were lost.

Personnel and Staff Development

Theresa had a Page meeting on March 14. Paying close attention to spine labels, shifting while shelving, and sorter room organization were the main topics.

Mark attended the Ryan Dowd webinar, Mental Illness Short Course: High Risk and Low-Risk Situations.

Stacey and Tonja attended the Ryan Dowd webinar, *Handling Problem Interactions with Law Enforcement-A Conversation with Sheriff Ron Hain.*

Equipment and Physical Facilities

New blinds were installed in the Community Room in early March.

The installation of new AV equipment in the Community Room has been completed. Staff is looking forward to using the new video recording capabilities for library programs.

Administration and Internal Operations

Stacey and Abby developed a strategic plan highlights brochure.

Stacey gave several tours to interested firms of the library as part of the Space Needs Assessment RFP process this month.

Marketing and Public Relations

This month Abby created 39 event graphics (website, Facebook, TV) with accompanying bookmarks, flyers, and signs.

Features highlighted on social media, e-newsletter, and website this month: Virtual Author Talk series and Top Requested Fiction and Non-fiction books during the last 6 months.

March Events e-Newsletter 1: 8,939 recipients March Events e-Newsletter 2: 8,916, recipients Maureen and Julia created a display celebrating Black History Month and another highlighting Irish authors. Julia created a display with *Wisconsin Eats* themed titles. Circulation staff created a display featuring cats and another celebrating Women's History Month.

Library System and Interagency Cooperation

Stacey and Theresa attended the All-Directors meeting at SCLS Headquarters on March 20. Theresa helped present the ILS Evaluation Lead Workgroup recommendations to the library directors, who will vote on the next steps at the May meeting.

Jenny hosted a webinar through UW-Madison's iSchool on Tuesday, March 11 titled, *HOW Many Pieces? Board Game Collection Management*. The Verona Public Library has about 230 board games for check out, the largest collection in SCLS. Jenny gave an overview of how we handle accession, check-in, repair, and weeding, as well as what game-related resources are available for librarians in Wisconsin and around the country. The webinar had 130 participants with an additional 23 watching the recording.

Jenny was also invited by the Wisconsin Department of Instruction to attend the Field Day Lab 10-Year Anniversary Celebration at the Memorial Union on March 4. The Field Day Lab has been "a pioneering effort in educational outreach, leveraging the power of video games to enhance learning experiences."

Mark attended the WISCAT User Group meeting on March 11. Mark reports that per capita, Wisconsin ranks first in the nation for ILL requests.

Tonja met with Bex Fabrizio from the Literacy Network for a mid-session check-in for the Spring 2025 Community English classes. Students are focusing in on health, nutrition, and the US system for everyday measurements. The Literacy Network has also translated a Know your Rights hand-out from the Immigrant Defense Project into 14 languages for the Community English students.

Tonja attended the SCLS Southwest Regional Equity Team meeting via Zoom on March 18.

The library is again participating in the DCLS collaboration with the American Players Theater, *Check Out APT 2025*. The program supplies vouchers to Dane County libraries for distribution to patrons. Each voucher is for 2 complimentary tickets to any Hill show. Vouchers will be available by APT's official start date of April 28.
